

Planning a personal funeral service

Our Catholic faith understands death as the entrance into eternity. The rites and ceremonies connected with Christian death and burial unite us to the paschal mystery of Christ's victory over sin and death, and must remain consonant with this belief.

The Mass of Christian Burial (funeral Mass) celebrates liturgical rites to help us through the immediate days of our grieving after a profound earthly loss such is the death of a loved one, to proclaim our belief in eternal life, and to help us pray for the one who has died.

Overall, the Mass of Christian Burial is a solemn and respectful occasion that honors the deceased person and provides comfort and support to their loved ones during a difficult time of grief and loss.

This booklet contains selections of prayers and readings from the *Order of Christian Funerals*, as well as appropriate liturgical music options. You are encouraged to use this funeral planning guide to personalize the celebration of your loved one's life at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph.

Readings

In this booklet is a list of prayers and scripture readings. You may select one for each of the following:

- Old Testament (pgs. 6 8)
- New Testament (pgs. 9 15)
- Prayers of the Faithful (pgs. 16 19)

Music

A selection of hymns is suggested for the following (pgs. 20 - 21):

- Entrance
- Presentation of Gifts
- Communion
- Recessional

Please keep in mind, secular music is not appropriate.

Color of the priest's vestments

The priest's choice of white vestments symbolizes Christian hope. Violet or black may also be worn as a sign of mourning.

Placing of the pall

The pall reminds us of the garment given at baptism, which symbolizes our life in Christ. It is draped over the casket at the beginning of the liturgy. Family members or friends may place the pall, although it is usually done by the funeral personnel. The pall is omitted when cremains are present.

Sprinkling of the Casket / Urn

We first share in the resurrection of the Lord through baptism. The priest sprinkles holy water over the casket or urn, recalling the Sacrament Baptism.

Paschal Candle

The paschal candle symbolizes the risen Christ and tells us He has conquered sin and death and now lives in our midst. In the Mass of Christian Burial, the candle is placed before the casket or urn as a reminder that the deceased shares in Jesus' victory over death.

Homily

Based on the Mass readings, the priest will offer a brief homily after the Gospel reading and provide reassurance to those present of the mysteries of God's love and Jesus' victorious death and resurrection, which were present in the life and death of the deceased. The homily will relate to the life of the deceased, but it is not meant to be a eulogy.

Presentation of Gifts

The Church encourages family members or friends to bring forward the gifts of bread and wine to the altar.

Holy Communion

The Eucharist is the most perfect way to share in the Funeral Mass, allowing those in attendance to receive the body and blood of Christ as a symbol of their faith in Jesus and His promise of eternal life. We welcome to Holy Communion those who practice the Catholic faith and are properly disposed.

Remarks of Remembrance (Eulogy)

At the end of the Funeral Mass, and before the final commendation, a family member or friend may speak up to five minutes in remembrance of the deceased. The eulogy should not overshadow the principal focus of the Church's Liturgy. This is an occasion to cite some of the Christian virtues of the deceased or how the departed inspired or deepened the faith of others during his or her life. Others wishing to speak may do so at the funeral home during calling hours or at the reception following the burial. It is never appropriate to recount off-color anecdotes or use profane language in the context of Mass or within this sacred space.

Incensing of the Deceased

During the Mass of Christian Burial, the priest walks around the casket or urn and incenses the remains as a sign of our respect for the remains. Incensing symbolizes our prayers for the deceased, rising to the throne of God, and it is a final farewell and commendation of the departed to God.

Cremation

When a family selects cremation, it is appropriate that the cremated remains of the body be present for the funeral rites.

For Christ, while we were still helpless, died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. How much more then, since we are now justified by his Blood, will be saved through him from the wrath. Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life. Not only that, but we also boast of God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters:

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection. We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

NT-3 We wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

Romans 8:14-23

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters:

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, Abba, "Father!" The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

Romans 8:31b-35, 37-39

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters:

If God is for us, who can be against us? He did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us. Who will condemn? It is Christ Jesus who indeed intercedes for us. What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword?

No, in all these things, we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

NT-5 Whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. Romans 14:7-9, 10c-12

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Brothers and sisters:

No one lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why then do you judge your brother? Or you, why do you look down on your brother? For we shall all stand before the judgement seat of God; for it is written: As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God. So then each of us shall give an accounting of himself to God.

For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ.

And when this which is corruptible clothes itself with incorruptibility and this which is mortal clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about: Death is swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting? The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

We know that the One who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God. Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

For we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

NT-9 We have a building from God, eternal in heaven. 2 Corinthians 5:1, 6-10

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Brothers and sisters:

We know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven. We are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yet we are courageous, and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord. Therefore, we aspire to please him, whether we are at home or away. For we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Thessalonians

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep. Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself, with the word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Thus we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore, console one another with these words.

Please select Option A, B, or C (pgs 17 - 19).

Immediately following the homily, The priest will announce the Prayers of the Faithful. During this announcement, the reader should approach the altar, bowing to the altar before stepping up into the sanctuary. The reader should walk to the the ambo (pulpit), and wait in place for the invitation to prayer to begin. Once complete, the reader should remain at the ambo until the celebrant has closed the prayer, and then return to his / her seat.

Go forth, Christian soul, from this world in the name of God the almighty Father, who created you, in the name of Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, who suffered for you, in the name of the Holy Spirit, who was poured out upon you, go forth, faithful Christian. Catholic Mass Protocol

Holy Water and Sign of the Cross

As you enter the cathedral, you will notice holy water fonts near each entrance for you to bless yourself. First, dip a finger of your right hand into the holy water, and with the same finger touch your forehead, saying "In the name of the Father," then touch your lower chest, saying, "the Son," next touch your left shoulder, saying, "and the Holy," and finally touch your right shoulder, saying "Spirit." Whenever you hear the priest say, "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit," everyone crosses themselves.

Genuflecting and Bowing

The general rule is that you bow to the altar, and genuflect (touch your right knee to the floor) to the tabernacle. The tabernacle is a locked box where the Body of Christ is kept. In the cathedral the tabernacle can be found in the chapel off to the right side of the main altar, marked by the sanctuary lamp, a burning candle in a red glass globe. If the tabernacle is in front of you, genuflect to it, otherwise, just bow to the altar. Remember, whenever you're walking around the church and you pass in front of the tabernacle, genuflect to it. As well, whenever you pass in front of the altar, bow to it.

Reading

It is not appropriate to greet the congregation or introduce yourself. Generally, there is no need to adjust the microphone at the ambo.

Scripture:

As the priest invites the reader forward, he or she should approach the altar, bowing to the altar before stepping up into the sanctuary. He or she should then walk to the ambo (pulpit), and begin reading. Once complete, he or she should return to his or her seat.

Prayers of the Faithful:

Immediately following the homily, the priest will announce the Prayers of the Faithful. <u>During this announcement</u>, the reader should approach the altar, bowing to the altar before stepping up into the sanctuary. He or she should then walk to the ambo (pulpit), and <u>wait in place for the invitation to prayer before beginning</u>. After reading, he or she should remain at the ambo until the priest has closed the prayer, and then return to his or her seat.

Gospel Reading

Before reading the Holy Gospel, the priest or deacon will announce:

"A reading from the Holy Gospel according to [whomever]." Everyone then traces a small cross with their right thumb on their forehead, on their lips, and on their heart. At the same time, they're saying:

Glory to you, O Lord.

The priest or deacon then reads the Gospel, and when he's finished, he says:

"The Gospel of the Lord."

Everyone responds:

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Sign of Peace

When the priest says:

"The peace of the Lord be with you always."

Everyone responds:

And with your spirit.

Then the priest or deacon says:

"Let us offer each other the sign of peace."

It's now time to give the sign of peace. You may gesture or shake hands with the people around you, and say to them, "Peace be with you." Some people like to hug, or exchange a kiss.

Catholic Mass Protocol (cont'd)

Receiving Holy Communion (the Body of Christ)

We welcome to Holy Communion those who practice the Catholic faith and are properly disposed. If you cannot receive the Body of Christ, you can still go up for a blessing. To show that you only want a blessing, cross both hands over your heart as you approach the altar. Once it is your turn, bow in acknowledgement of Christ's presence, and after the person giving out the Body of Christ says:

"The body of Christ."


You say:

Amen.

You may choose to take Holy Communion on your tongue or in your hand. To take it on the tongue, simply open your mouth and stick out your tongue a little, and the Body of Christ will be placed on your tongue. To take it in your hand, cup your right hand under your left, and hold your hands out in front of your chest. Remember that you're holding the most precious thing there is. Put it in your mouth, and check for any crumbs so you can eat them as well (these crumbs are also the Body of Christ). DO NOT walk around with it in your hands, and DO NOT give it to anyone else.

Remarks of Remembrance (Eulogy)

The eulogy takes place at the end of the Funeral Mass, but before the final commendation. The speaker may speak up to five minutes in remembrance of the deceased. The eulogy should not overshadow the principal focus of the Church's Liturgy. This is an occasion to cite some of the Christian virtues of the deceased or how the departed inspired or deepened the faith of others during his or her life. Others wishing to speak may do so at the funeral home during calling hours or at the reception following the burial. Although this is a more casual address than when Scripture is read, it is never appropriate to recount off-color anecdotes or use profane language within this sacred space.
